## For the following questions, please be thorough and genuine in your responses.

- I. After conducting research on the Global Brigades organization, how do you recognize the sustainability and collaboration Global Brigades uses in planning and conducting a brigade? Explain how the Holistic Model works in the context of GMDB. How does the Holistic model promote sustainability rather than dependency? Why is that so important? Give specific examples you have found during your research of Global Brigades as a global organization and our chapter at WVU.
- II. "If you don't get out of the box you've been raised in, you won't understand how much bigger the world is." ~Angelina Jolie
  - a. In response to this quote, state why you believe it is important to travel and challenge the ideas and norms that you have been socialized.
    - i. **First time Brigaders:** How do you imagine that you will be challenged on brigade and how will you respond to this challenge on brigade and in the future?
    - ii. **Returning Brigaders:** What was the most significant challenge you managed on a previous brigade and how have you used that to improve your current life?
- III. Pulitzer Prize winner and reporter for the New York Times Nicolas Kristof once said, "I have always been interested in public health approaches, because it seems to me, we have this yearning for silver bullets, and that is not in fact how change comes about. Change comes through silver buckshot — a lot of little things that achieve results."
  - **a.** Why is it important to have a sociological understanding of health and medicine? What social factors influence health and medicine across the United States (including but not limited to West Virginia) and how do those compare to the regions where Global Brigades function?
- IV. Many Americans do not have access to healthcare, affordable healthcare, and/or the ability to obtain it. The average life expectancy in both rural Panama and in Appalachia is about 77 years. Why do you think our region of the United States has a similar life expectancy to many resource reduced regions of the world? What are some similar and dissimilar health factors in both regions? Consider how social determinants of health and health disparities impact both regions.

- a. To go on this brigade, it will cost you about \$3,500, you will be expected to attend football cleanups, food pantries, and small group meetings on top of regular class meetings. This is significantly more involvement than all study-abroad programs at WVU.
  - i. Why is it important for you to be a part of this program? What do you hope to gain from Global Medical and Dental Brigades that you could not get from another study abroad?
